OUR KEY FINDINGS

Based on community engagement and discussions here at Parliament, the PWG has identified several key findings and insights. We have summarised the many insights into three key findings:



PASIFIKA STAFF MEMBERS

• Within our group's accounts their from community engagement and talanoa with other young people in area, we all identified Pasifika students benefit greatly from having teachers that are Pasifika, that look like them, that reflect their own values and belief systems, and hold who strong understanding of the cultures the Pacific which from significantly contribute Aotearoa.

RACISM AND DISCRIMINATION IN SCHOOLS

 Many of us had findings of teachers being casually racist to Pacific young people, whether this was by continuously mispronouncing names or by underestimating Pasifika youth, placing them in a box

LANGUAGE WEEKS

- We appreciate the point that we've reached in celebrating language weeks, many children that we surveyed identified that they felt that the representation occurring through language weeks did not continue throughout the year within school.
- Isolated events
- Often run by Pasifika families, and students pressured to organise in their own time

Government/MOE to collect data on racial discrimination in schools – this provides us with a starting point in understanding the lived experiences/qualitative data we already have

Making Tapasā framework compulsory for teachers across Aotearoa in an ongoing PLD nature
